AMONG the various methods designed for promoting knowledge, no one appears better adapted to that important end than a publick Library. An institution of this kind is so generous and extensive in its nature, that it affords instruction on the most easy terms to all who are desirous of improvement. The opulent friend to learning may be furnished with authors not generally found in private collections; whilst the genius which might languish and be discouraged for want of proper opportunities, may have access to many volumes, containing the experience of past ages and the present times. When men thus possess the means of being acquainted with the arts and sciences, it may justly be expected that important enquiries will be prosecuted, and the good of society increased.

Sensible of the great advantages to be derived from this fruitful source, certain gentlemen laid the foundation of the present Library, in the year 1731, and soon had the satisfaction of seeing it enlarge, and prove useful, the best compensation for their care and services. In 1742 a charter was obtained, with Power to make laws, &c. incorporating them by the name of **THE LIBRARY COMPANY OF PHILADLEPHIA.**

Other Gentlemen of this city animated with the same liberal sentiments, and the success of these worthy Men, thought it necessary that more Libraries should be formed. These when estab-

blished became also of publick utility, and remained long in a flourishing condition. The members however of the respective companies, considering, that for many reasons it would conduce more to the advancement of literature, if the different libraries were united, agreed to join their Interests together, which in the year 1769, was happily accomplished.

That affairs may be better regulated, ten directors or managers of the library, and a Treasurer are chosen yearly, by vote, at a general meeting of the company.

The price of a share is fixed to ten pounds, and the annual payment of ten shillings: for which small consideration a person may have recourse not only to some thousand volumes, but to many valuable machines for making experiments in natural philosophy. The members hold their estates in the library as tenants in common, and may dispose of their shares by will or deed to others with the assent of the managers. They who incline to be admitted, apply to any one of the directors, who proposes them at their next meeting and being approved of, they become members on paying the purchase money to the treasurer.

Persons who are not members may, notwithstanding, borrow books, leaving in the hands of the librarian, as a pledge, a sum of money in proportion to the value of the book, and paying a small acknowledgement for the reading, which is applied to the benefit of the library.

Besides the books hereafter mentioned in the catalogue as presents to the library, the company have been favoured with several generous donations; as,

An electrical apparatus; a large pair of globes; a large reflecting telescope; a large double microscope; a large camera obscura, and a valuable lot of ground whereon to build a house for the library, given by the Honourable THOMAS PENN Esq;

Pennsylvania fossils, &c. given by Mr. *Bartram*.

Instruments and utensils of the *Eskimaux*, given by the *North-West company*.

A Snake's skin, twelve feet long, and fifteen inches over.

A Piece of marble, lately dug out of the ruins of *Herculaneum*. An

An antique pewter dish, given by Mr. *Stephen Paschall*.

A very beautiful concha, given by *R. G.*

A Malabar manuscript, on leaves, given by the reverend Mr. *Hugh Jones*.

A Sea feather,

Some curious snakes, scorpions, &c. in a bottle of spirits.

A twelve inch concave reflecting mirror, given by *B. F.*

Mitchell's map of *North-America*.

Prospect of *London*, from *Westminster-bridge* to *London-bridge*, by *Messieurs Bucks*.

Prospect of *Portsmouth*, by ditto.

A large cabinet, containing a very curious collection of *American fossils*, with several species of earth, clay, sand, &c. all methodically disposed, and explained by a numerical list or catalogue, giving an account from what place each sample was brought. This collection was the work of Mr. *Samuel Hazard*, late of this city, merchant, and was purchased for the company since his decease.

Two manuscripts in rolls, in the *Russian* language and character, given by Mr. *Lewis Timothy*.

The hand and arm of an *Egyptian* mummy presented by Mr. *Benjamin West*.

An hydrostatical balance with its appurtenances. Two solar microscopes. An air pump. Two pair of globes &c.

They possess also a handsome house in this city.

The valuable Collection of ancient *MEDALS*, in the Library, was received from England, (through the Hands of the Honourable Proprietary, *THOMAS PENN, Esq;*) with the following Remarks and Account of them.

THE Roman coins hereafter mentioned, are a small specimen of the several sorts of money made use of in that famous Empire, and are a present from Mr. *Gray*, of *Colchester*, to the public library of *Philadelphia*, as a token of the honour and esteem which he has for *Pennsylvania*.

Medals, merely considered as curiosities, are of very little value, and hardly worth the attention of prudent men; but when

they are regarded as proofs and illustrations of history, or when the legends or reverses contain any useful instructions, some benefit may be obtained from them.

The two first of the silver are consular, and struck before the time of the emperors. That with the head of *Ceres*, and the oxen at the plow on the reverse, may not only allude to the superstitious ceremony used upon marking out a new colony, but to the agriculture, upon which the public welfare depends. The other, with the horseman on the reverse, regards purely the military glory of which that people were so fond, and which at last proved their ruin, when their old laws were turned into a military government.

The first of the two is the properest present to *Pennsylvania*, tho' something may be learned from the latter: A military force, for necessary self-defence, is often wanted, to preserve what industry has gained; but it never should be allowed to extend itself so far, as to endanger what it is designed to protect.

Though we ought not to let our trust in providence run into presumption, or to the neglect of those means which are put into our hands; yet there is something more to be expected of security to this province, than to any other; because they set out upon a better foundation. There is hardly an instance in the world, of a people's growing to such a number, and such a degree of strength, without any one war, or military enterprize.

It is most ardently to be wished, that the same virtue with which they began, and have hitherto continued, may remain as their support for ages to come. While their virtue, their liberty, and their moderation last, their security will, in all probability, continue.

The silver imperial medals, any of the books upon that subject will explain; and for want of time they are but very slightly mentioned in the catalogue.

As to the first of the silver, it may be observed that the workmanship of it is *Greek*, and far superior to any that follow.

The *Grecian* free states (which some of our northern colonies resemble) carried all arts and sciences into the greatest perfection.

The medallion of *Vespasian* is quite a picture of him, as are also most of the rest; but as the empire declined, the work grew worse; at best, it did not come up to the *Greek*.

The *Palladium* on the reverse of *Vespasian's* coin, and many others, was probably emblematical. It was a gift of *Minerva*, that is *wisdom*; and while that was with them, *Rome* was safe.

The last in the card of *M. Aurelius* is of very good work. That of *Maguentius* in middle brass, with the christain ensign upon it, is very barbarous and mean. The gross barbarism of those times on the one hand, and the *Platonian* refinements on the other, were enough to destroy any thing but absolute truth.

The

The medals in small brass, of *Constantine*, and the rest, are good, and well preserved; and that of *Helena* not easily to be met with. She was our townswoman, and we have several authentic memorials of her.

The last, of *Rome*, with the wolf on the reverse, and the founders of the city sucking her, is emblematical likewise, and to be found on many of the medals of the higher empire. If the *Romans* would, by this, have been put in mind of their original, and preserved their humility, a virtue they often practised in their best times (though they never pretended to it, nor had even a name for it as a *Virtue*) it would have saved their state, and stopped the luxury which proved their ruin.

A LAW directing the Manner of admitting new Members.

IT IS ENACTED by the LIBRARY COMPANY of Philadelphia, That no Person who shall hereafter become possessed of a Share in the Books and Effects of the said Company, shall be thereby entitled to a Vote in any of their Affairs, or be deemed a Member, without first being approved of by the Directors for the Time being; nor shall any Person, other than the Heirs, Executors, or Assigns of a Member of the said Company, be entitled to a Share in the Books, Estate and Effects of the said Company, without paying into the Hands of the said Company's Treasurer, so much Money as in the Judgment of the said Directors a Share shall then be worth.

None to be admitted, without being first approved, &c.

AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, That upon Approbation of the Directors, and
Payment

Treasurer to give a Certificate.

Payment of the said Money, the Party paying it, shall receive of the Treasurer a Certificate under his Hand, and the Seal of the Company, containing the Name of the Person, and the Sum paid, the Time when, and the Account or Use for which he paid it : Of all which a Record shall be made in the Records of the said Company. Which Certificate shall entitle the Person therein mentioned, to a Share in the Company's Books, Estate and Effects, and to be deemed a Member.

Record to be made.

A LAW for preserving a just Equality among the Members, and to prevent the Inconveniencies that may arise by any Persons holding more than one Share.

No Member shall sell his Share to another Member, &c.

IT IS ENACTED, for the Preservation of a just Equality among the Members of the Library Company, That no Person being a Member, and holding a Share in the Library, &c. shall Grant, Sell, or Convey to any other Member, or accept of a Grant, Bargain, Sale, or other Conveyance or Assurance from any other Member, of any Share or Shares in the Books, Estate, and Effects of the said Company ; on Penalty of Forfeiting to the Company such Share or Shares, so purchased, sold, granted, or conveyed.

No Member to have more than one Vote, &c.

AND if any Member, as Executor or Administrator of another, or by any other Means, come to have in his Hands a Plurality of Shares, he shall not thereby be

be entitled to more than one Vote at Elections, or on any other Occasion, nor have a Right to take out more Books at one Time than any other Member.

A LAW for Regulating Elections of Officers, and declaring their Trust and Duty.

FOR the better Preservation of Order and Government among the Library Company of *Philadelphia*, and in the Use, Application and Management of the Monies, Library and Effects of the said Company, IT IS ENACTED, That the Members of the said Company shall, in Person, or by Proxy, annually attend at the Place of Election in the City of *Philadelphia*, on the first *Monday* of the Month of *May*, in every Year; and that as many as so meet, and appear to be duly qualified, shall proceed to the Choice of a Person of the Company, to be the Company's Treasurer, and Ten other Persons of the Company, to be Directors for the Year next ensuing, and so from Year to Year. The Place of Election to be agreed on by the Directors of the current Year, and notified by their Secretary, twenty Days at least before the Election, by printed Advertisements. The Electors to chuse by written Tickets, each containing the names of the ten Persons voted Directors, and the Name of the Person voted Treasurer; and those who shall thereupon appear to have a Majority of Votes, shall be the Company's Treasurer, and the Directors, respectively,

That the Directors shall, and are hereby required and empowered, to nominate some fit Person of the Company to be their Secretary for the Year ensuing, who shall preside and collect the Votes at the Election aforesaid, and shall faithfully enter, in a Book to be kept for that Purpose, the Names of the said Electors, and the Number of the Names of the Candidates, according to the Tickets.

Electors to appoint Assistants to the Secretary, &c.

THAT it shall and may be lawful to and for the Electors aforesaid, when so met, to appoint Persons to assist the Secretary in gathering the Votes, and entering and numbering the Names of the Electors and Persons voted for, and other Service appertaining to the Election, and to appoint and direct any Method and Rule in proceeding to and making the said Election, so as they appoint or direct nothing to prejudice the Right of any Member, or infringe the Charter or Laws of the Company.

Director refusing to act, &c. the rest may nominate another.

THAT if any Person elected Director, shall refuse to act, or shall happen to die or depart this Province, so as to be absent for the Space of two Months, in any of the first ten Months of the Year for which he shall be elected Director; or if within the same Year, or Term of his Office, he shall be confined by Sickness, or otherwise rendered incapable of executing the Office of a Director, according to the true Meaning hereof, the rest of the Directors, as often as Occasion shall require, in any of

of the Cases aforesaid, shall proceed in their Duty and Office without him; or, if they think fit, they shall nominate some other suitable Person to supply his Place of a Director, until the then next ensuing Election.

THAT if any Person so elected Treasurer, shall absent himself from his said Office for the Space of thirty Days, or shall otherwise be rendered incapable, or neglect his Office or Duty of Treasurer, in the Judgment of the Directors for the Time being, it shall and may be lawful for the Directors to displace him from any longer Continuation in his said Office: And the Directors causing their Secretary to make a Minute for the Purpose, containing their Reasons for displacing him, he shall thereupon, and from thenceforth cease to be the Treasurer aforesaid; and shall, upon Notice thereof, adjust and settle with the Directors, and pay and deliver the Company's Money and Effects in his Hands, to such Person as the Directors shall order and appoint: And in that Case, and so often, and also if the Treasurer shall depart this Life, the Person who at the last Election had the greatest Number of Votes, next the Highest (if alive, willing and capable) shall be substituted Treasurer, to supply the Place of such deceased or displaced Treasurer; for which Purpose the Secretaries presiding at Elections shall preserve the Votes: But if the said Person cannot, or will not, serve, the Directors shall nominate another Person of the Company, but

THAT every Person so chosen to be the Company's Treasurer, immediately upon entering into his Office, shall receive of the preceding Treasurer, his Heirs, Executors or Administrators, the Company's Cash and Books of Accounts; giving his Receipt for the same; and shall enter into an Obligation, with one sufficient Surety, in double the Value that doth, or probably may come into his Hands during the Continuance of his Office, as near as can be estimated by the Directors, unto the Library Company of *Philadelphia*, conditioned that he will once a Month, or oftener, if required, well and truly adjust, account and settle with them, for and concerning all Monies that are or shall come into his Hands, belonging to the said Company; and that he will well and truly deliver up and pay the balance of the Monies remaining in his Hands, together with the Books of Accounts concerning the same, and the Company's Papers in his Keeping, unto his Successor in the said Office, or such other Person or Service as the Directors for the Time being shall order and appoint, and not otherwise; and that he will observe, do, and execute all other Things as the Company's Treasurer aforesaid, according to the Sense and true Meaning of this Law.

THAT all Officers and Servants belonging to the Company, other than their Treasurer, shall be in the Choice, and

and under the Order and Direction of the Directors, who shall be accountable for their Fidelity, and may displace them, and appoint others, as often as they shall think fit : Which Directors shall have the Power of calling General Meetings, when they judge it necessary for the Interest of the Company, and shall cause due and public Notice to be given of the Occasion and Design or Purpose of such Meetings ; and shall nominate some discreet Member to preside therein, and regulate the Debates thereof : They shall also have the Disposal of the Monies paid to the Treasurer to and for the Use and Service of the Library ; they shall have the Choosing of Books for the Library ; the Renting a House or Place for the Service of the Library ; the furnishing the same with Presses, Shelves, and other Things necessary and fit ; the Keeping and Power of Affixing the Seal of the Company ; which Seal shall be and remain the same that is now used and affixed to this Law, until another shall be appointed ; the lending of Books ; the appointing Securities for the Return of the Books to the Library, and the Prices of the Loans ; the Printing and Dispersing of Catalogues ; the Admission of new Members, under the Limitations and Conditions now or hereafter to be established by the Laws of the Company ; the Settling the Accounts with the Company's Treasurer ; the Payment of House-Rent, Servants and Officers Wages, and all other incident Charges belonging to the Company. Moreover the Directors are hereby

by invested with a discretionary Power to make suitable Returns (on Behalf of the Company) unto such Benefactors as shall honour them by Donations or otherwise.

AND for the more orderly Execution of the Duty and Trust belonging to the said Directors, they are hereby required to meet once a Month, at the Place where the Library shall be kept, or some other fit Place in the said City of *Philadelphia*, to confer and conclude concerning the Matters hereby committed to them. In every of which Meetings of the Directors aforesaid, Seven of their Number met shall be a Quorum, capable to consult, confer, and conclude, of and upon all Matters appertaining to the Directors, according to the Laws and Constitutions of the Company: And whatever Six of the Number so met shall so conclude, shall be deemed and taken for and as the Resolution of the Directors for the Time, and accordingly entered in the Minutes.

THAT the Charter granted to the said Company shall be deposited in the Library, for the Inspection and Perusal of all Persons concerned; who shall also have Recourse to the Journals of the Directors, the Minutes and Entries of their Secretaries, with the Treasurer's Accounts, and all other Books and Papers belonging to the Company; and may, if the Directors think fit, take Copies thereof. A

A LAW for ascertaining the Fines for neglecting the yearly Payments.

(Altered by a Law passed the 13th of March, 1769.)

A LAW for Recording the Laws of the Company, and the Names of such Persons as shall hereafter be admitted Members thereof; &c.

TO THE END that the Laws of the Library Company of *Philadelphia* may be securely preserved, and that every Member of the said Company may have Opportunity of being fully acquainted therewith; IT IS HEREBY ENACTED by the said Company, that all Laws passed at the General Meetings of the said Company, pursuant to their Charter, shall be recorded* in a large bound Book, of good Paper, which shall be safely kept in the Library for the Perusal of the Company; and that every law so recorded, shall be certified and subscribed in the said Book by the Secretary for the time being.

AND IT IS HEREBY FURTHER ENACTED by the said Company, That every Person who now is, or that hereafter shall be admitted, and become a Member of the said Company (other than those whose Names are inserted in the Charter) shall have his Name, and the Time of his becoming a Member as aforesaid, recorded in the said Book of Records, and certified by the Secretary, as aforesaid.

A LAW for preventing any Advantage by Survivorship, among the Members of the Library Company.

IT IS ENACTED, That the Members of the Library Company of *Philadelphia*, shall hold their Estate and Interest in the said Company, as Tenants in Common, and not as Joint Tenants.

The foregoing LAWS were all enacted and published May the 3d, 1742.

A LAW for reducing and fixing the Price at which a Share in the Library may be purchased, and to enable the Directors to dispose of Duplicates of Books, &c.

FOR the increasing the Funds of the Library Company of *Philadelphia*, for the enlarging the Collection of Books and facilitating the Advancement of Knowledge and Literature, **I**T IS ENACTED by the said Library Company, That any Person or Persons (who shall be approved of by the Directors for the Time being) shall be admitted a Member or Members of the said Company, and be entitled to a Share in the Books,

Fixing the Price
of a Share.

Books, Effects and Estate of the said Company, as fully to all Intents and Purposes as any Member now is or may or can be, upon paying into the Hands of the said Company's Treasurer, the Sum of Ten Pounds, lawful Money of Pennsylvania, and receiving a Certificate, &c. agreeable to the Directions of a Law directing the Manner of admitting new Members.

AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, That the Directors of the said Company for the Time being, shall and may from Time to Time, as to them shall seem meet, sell and dispose of such Duplicates and broken Setts of Books as shall be found in the said Library, and the Monies arising from such Sale to pay to the Company's Treasurer, for the Use of the said Library.

A LAW for ascertaining the Fines for neglecting the Yearly Payments.

WHEREAS by a Law of the Library Company of Philadelphia, entitled "*A Law for ascertaining the Fines for neglecting the Yearly Payments,*" it is, amongst other Things, Enacted, "That if any Member or Members of the said Company shall neglect to pay his or their Yearly Payments,
for

for any Time not exceeding Three Months, from and after the first *Monday* in *May*, that he or they shall pay the Sum of *Five Shillings* as a Fine, together with the said *Ten Shillings* ;” which said Law has been found inconvenient and too strict :

Fines settled.

IT IS THEREFORE HEREBY ENACTED, by the Library Company of *Philadelphia* aforesaid, That if any Member make his Yearly Payment within Ten Days after the said first *Monday* in *May*, the same shall be accepted without a Fine ; but if any Member neglect to pay the Yearly Sum aforesaid, on the said first *Monday* in *May*, and for ten Days afterwards, and for any Time longer, not exceeding three Months from and after the said first *Monday* in *May*, such Member shall pay to the Treasurer for the Time being, the Fine of *Five Shillings*, together with his said Yearly Payment. And for neglecting as aforesaid for any Time above three Months, and not exceeding six Months, the Fine of *Ten Shillings*. And for neglecting as aforesaid for any Time above Six Months and not exceeding Nine Months, the Fine of *Fifteen Shillings*. And for neglecting as aforesaid for any Time above Nine Months and not exceeding Twelve Months the Fine of *Twenty Shillings*. Any Thing in the said recited Law to the Contrary in any Wise notwithstanding.

A LAW to enable the Directors of the Library Company of Philadelphia, to admit the Members of the Union Library Company of Philadelphia.

WHEREAS it is conceived that great Advantages may arise to the Public, as well as to the individual Members, by a Union of the Library Companies' afore said. In order to effect the same, **BE IT ENACTED** by the Library Company of *Philadelphia*, That their Directors for the Time being, shall have full Power and Authority to admit the Members of the said Union Library Company ; and that each Member so admitted, shall, by Virtue thereof, be entitled to an Equal Share of all the Estate both Real and Personal, belonging to the said Library Company of *Philadelphia*, in common with their other Members ; and shall receive accordingly Certificates thereof. **PROVIDED ALWAYS**, That, previous thereto, the said Union Library Company do assign over and convey all their Estate, both Real and Personal, to the said Library Company of *Philadelphia*, and deliver Possession thereof to the Directors for the Time being ; subject nevertheless to all such Contracts heretofore made and now subsisting between the said Union Library Company and any of their Members, as the said Directors shall deem proper and expedient.

Directors have Power to admit the Members of the Union Library Company.

by a LAW of the COMPANY, to be
observed in the LIBRARY, *viz.*

THE *Librarians* shall attend at the *Library* on every *Tuesday, Thursday* and *Saturday*, from the twentieth day of March, to the twentieth day of September, from 5 o'clock until 9 in the afternoon; and from the twentieth day of September, to the twentieth day of March, from 4 o'clock until 8, in the afternoon; in order to lend, let out, and receive *Books, &c.* and shall keep a book, column-wise, in which shall be noted the name of the borrower or hirer, alphabetically; the title, size, volume, and number of the book; the time for which the book is lent or hired; the sum for which the note is given; the time when the book is returned; the time it is kept out; the sum deposited as security; and the forfeitures arising for all defaults. *Also, they shall enter in the CATALOGUE, kept at the Library, such new books as may be purchased or added to the Library; label and number the same, as well as all others from which the label or number may be torn off or defaced. They shall also replace the books on the shelves, as they are brought*

brought in, as soon as they conveniently can, first having examined the same, to see if free from damage.

II. They shall lend to any *Member*, on the days above mentioned, who shall apply for the same,

and no greater number, unless on hire, or so connected as to be otherwise useless. Such persons, however, who reside at the distance of five miles and upwards, from the city, are permitted to have books double the above-mentioned time.—For all books so lent, they shall take a note, payable to the company, for double the value, as high as they can estimate, of the book or set of books to which they belong, conditioned to return the same undefaced, within the time above-mentioned, at the expiration of which (unless application has been made by another *Member* for the same books, and the Librarian requested to take a memorandum thereof) the borrower, if he inclines, may renew his note for the like time.

III. Every person not being a *Member*, who shall hire a book, &c. shall first give a note for double the value thereof, in the same manner, and be subject to the same regulations as a *Member*; and shall also deposit as security, in the hands of the Librarians, double the value of such book or books: but if the book or books should belong to a set, then such person shall deposit treble the value of the volume or volumes which he shall so take out: for which book or books so hired, he shall pay, for the use of the Library, until the expiration of his note,

the books should be returned within the week.

IV. Every Member or other person who shall neglect to return the book or books, within the time specified in his note, shall pay to the Librarians for such neglect, for the use of the Library, *four pence* for each time the Library is afterwards opened for letting out books: and if not returned within one month from the expiration of the time limited in the note, and all fines accruing paid off, the note or deposite money shall be deemed forfeited to the Company.

V. Books returned are to be delivered into the hands of the Librarians, to be examined whether damaged or not.

VI. No person from whom any hire or forfeiture is due, or who hath damaged any book, shall be permitted to have another book till satisfaction be made.

VII. If it should happen that a *Member*, and one who *is not a Member*, should apply for the same book at the same time, the *Member* shall have the preference.

VIII. A Member may take out on hire, without a deposite, as many books in value for which his share in the Library shall, by the Librarians, be deemed a sufficient security, on the same terms in other respects, as persons who are not Members.

IX. None

IX. None but *Members* shall be admitted with-
in the rails.

X. The Librarians, from their Book of En-
tries, shall make out a list of the forfeitures which
have arisen, in a book to be kept for that pur-
pose ; and, on the first *Monday* in every month,
they shall deliver to the secretary, a copy of the
same, to be laid before the directors, at the usual
meetings.
